- Name the alleys based on significant Olympia history
- Partner with other commissions, associations and groups to promote alley improvements and to encourage alley use by bicyclists and pedestrians

Steam Ship Theme Selected


- · Honor significant innovations in transportation
- Name the alleys after significant steamboats from the Mosquito Fleet
- The alleys all touch water, and the project then dovetails with ongoing waterfront improvements
- Matching historic steamboats to individual alleys can be done based on prominence
- Each alley will ideally have a mural or interpretative sign, in addition to the identifying sign- similar to a street sign.

First, some history on The Mosquito fleet

"Puget Sound's historic 'Mosquito Fleet' consisted of thousands of steamships that steamed from port to port around the sound from the 1850s to the 1930s. They were so numerous that people said they resembled a 'swarm of mosquitoes.' The heyday of the Mosquito Fleet ended in the 1930s when competition with rail and road transportation put the fleet out of business."


