Strategies to Achieve the Thurston Region's Urban Vision

Creating the kind of dynamic urban centers called for in local and regional plans is difficult, especially when that entails the retrofit of old highway arterials into people-oriented places. It takes more than "smart growth" policies to attract mixed-use redevelopment and infill investments. It takes a different

way of thinking about growth, one in which growth is an asset to help achieve important community objectives.

ACHIEVING OUR URBAN VISION

Adopted land use and transportation plans envision the emergence centers offering an array of "car-lite" lifestyle available in Thurston County. This is an ambitious goal for a region our size. Achieving this takes more than vision and regulations. It takes proactive, strategic measures on the part of local governments, and new public/private partnerships. It requires new ways of thinking about the value of urban investments and development, and that takes political leadership and courage. It will take bold measures to make our urban vision real.

This work was conducted by the Urban Corridors Task Force. The Task Force was a joint subcommittee of the Thurston Regional Planning Council and its Transportation Policy Board. Its mission was to establish an objective understanding of background conditions along the region's key urban corridors, identify and understand barriers to achieving adopted land use visions, and make recommendations for how to address those barriers. Task Force members looked at the relationship between transportation and land use in these corridors, and worked to understand the market factors that influence the viability of infill and redevelopment projects in this region. This phase of their work concluded in November 2011.
