Provide a brief project summary, including the phase of the overall project, and the public benefit.

1) Describe the entire project and the phase of the overall project for which funds are requested: The project will restore approximately 400 lineal feet of eroding shoreline along Olympia Avenue in downtown Olympia (see attached photos). The project will use a combination of methods to stabilize and protect the shoreline, including soft (habitat friendly) armoring and placement of large woody debris. State funding will support all phases of the project, including design, permitting and construction. This project addresses an emerging need. Shoreline erosion in this area (if unabated) threatens an adjacent trail, roadway and other public facilities. The total project cost including design, permitting and construction (with contingency) is \$775,000.

2) Public benefit of the project: The project will restore full pedestrian access along a popular shoreline trail, and will protect critical public facilities including Olympia Avenue and underground utilities within the adjacent right-of-way. Loss of adjacent sewer lines due to shoreline erosion could lead to a significant sewage discharge to Budd Inlet. The soft NOTE: This form is prepared for the use of Representative Dunshee.
