The heat tests everyone's patience, and sadly downtown reached a boiling point mid-month. The fight in Sylvester Park was a stark reminder of how some crowds have become isolated from the greater Downtown community. Although the park is outside the Ambassadors' zone, we're inspired by those who responded by spending more time there. After witnessing the fight outside her business, Lisa Cosmillo of Breathe Olympia began offering yoga classes in the park, in an effort to invite more diversity to the space. After all, the commons belongs to everyone. As Downtown Ambassadors, our response is to continue building and strengthening relationships with all who here—including finds themselves experiencing hardship. We attended training on Emotional CPR, and learned how to support someone in crisis by listening deeply, connecting authentically, and empowering the person to handle what comes up, with the resources available.

There's no such thing as an overnight fix to generational problems, but anyone who has experienced trauma (including homelessness, violence, or addictions) will tell you that a genuine connection with someone who cares can really make the difference.
