Public Engagement Activities

Winter-Spring 2016 Outreach - Phase 1

Phase 1 is, primarily, to identify gaps in our current Critical Areas Ordinance regarding Best Available Science (BAS) and other Growth Management Act requirements. The main thrust of outreach during Phase 1 includes staff creating and updating a webpage on the City website, providing ongoing information in City enewsletters, creating an "interested party" contact list, and briefing Council and City advisory committees on the status of the CAO update at their public meetings.

Summer-Winter 2016 – Phase 2 (Protection of Species and Habitat)

Phase 2 is to identify locally important species and/or habitats that the community wishes to protect and choose options to achieve that goal. Following is a conceptual outreach framework, to be further developed in conjunction with our consultant:

- Create a broad, open participation process that engages public/stakeholders in the evaluation of information and options for protecting locally important species and habitats
- Host at least one public workshop in summer 2016
- Continue to disseminate information via City webpage and e-newsletters
- Present updates to Council and advisory committees
- Conduct public hearing(s)
