It will be mutually educational. I can learn more and I can share what I've learned over the decades of research and action.

I am a product of the K-12 educational system in Olympia so have been bestowed the bestest qualifications and taught only the highest quality skills for civic participation, right? SKILL: Wreading, Riting, and Rithmath I have walked, bicycled, and driven most every highway/roadway in the city (sometimes even in official city vehicles). My conscious memory is only of 'being' in Olympia with few exceptions. I am OLYMPIAN, as everyone else who claims to be, whether Native American, immigrant, refugee, or descendant of slaves. SKILL: Existence I grew up admist a variety of Olympians and talked to them on their personal/familial history and the overall history of the area including a survivor from Hiroshima, a depression-area pugilist, prohibition bootleggers, logging-camp indentured servants, hate system/crime survivors (including Nisqually/Squaxin members). SKILL: Olympians I can and have done local historical research on topics/events including housing, treaty rights, police harassment, suffragette/abolitionism, municipal corruption and more. Some of which I have published in the monthly periodical, Works In Progress, established May 1990 (archived by UofW). SKILL: I likely know how to operate the microfilm appliances at local libraries better than the staff. Most importantly, with this application submission, I am here, willing and able in my capacities to participate in the non-exploitive role of this committee. Plus, I have the opportunity to currently reside in the historical County Courthouse of 1861.

3. Describe your involvement in the Olympia community.

I am actively involved in the Olympia Community and valued in MY Olympia Community. My Olympia Community is of people often on the defense of the Olympia community who defines itself by ownership/property. Communities and subcommunities have existed nonetheless for generations back to the imposition of the town itself despite murder, rape, torture, theft, harassment, discrimination, and abandonment--generally cruel and unusual punishments. Just recently, I was banned from a number of Olympia Community social media sites for posting on the anniversary of the Medicine Creek Treaty that essentially the settlers were homeless men downtown who stole the land, lives and livelihood of the indigenous, true Olympians. Suffice to say, I happen to have been afforded the opportunity of a formal collegiate degree (not from Trump University) in Postmodern Theory which means nothing and makes me uniquely qualified for just about anything. I was also separately preparing a master's thesis on the evolution of traffic laws. That was all a long time ago and the rest of this application should demonstrate my informal (non-commercialized) education and professed areas of study. I am authentic to my values in saying, given the stranglehold of capitalism, I have managed to survive all this time with dignity not so much through employment, but more importantly through community contact and the founding/operating of local community oriented non-profits including a periodical, a tenant's union, and a credit union. 10. Why do you think Olympia's historic places are important?

History is a virtual reality as is the future. Buildings exist and give material/structural insight into evolving reality as well as disappearing back in time/history. History is a virtual reality as is the future. A building present here can be a real link to virtual realities encouraged. So are city infrastructure and even empty spaces--and they may have a better story. One not complicated by a loud voice from the past forcing its select virtual narrative on a reality in an antiquated language that no one understands. Buildings are often monuments to wealth and stability, but also stand in stark contrast to the reality of the dispossessed, the property-less, and the targeted disenfranchised. Given that each observer has their own individual perspective that is influenced by factors in their life through a seemingly never-ending changing lens of technology and societal/political evolution, I would like to see more progress into updating the dominant narrative of Olympia's (and WA's) heritage so as to be receptive and heard by the anticipated and real virtual reality of the future. One that builds community across class divides. One that anticipates a future, ever-faster in evolution, that show the Olympian spirit of overcoming the obstacles of the past. Heritage should focus not on glamourizing the past, but celebrating people's survival despite the odds. And Olympia is ripe for transformation. Historical hotels don't mention that certain olympians (Natives, Single Women) were excluded from accommodations and services. And often from owning property at all. But their struggle is apart of our heritage. When I give a tour of the building I currently reside in, I point out that although it's likely Susan B. Anthony visited the local county courthouse after it moved to another structure/location in 1871, she likely travelled by coach right out front along Union Ave. And even though she worked actively to extend voting rights to women, she also actively worked to suppress voting rights for women of color and all other POC. Then I point out that I hope the cross-street was named more for John Quincy Adams rather than for John Adams because of his more anti-slavery position. Ultimately, I pray that it's named for Gomez Addams, a homeowner who openly embraced all varieties of family and friends. More than 1,700 monuments, school names, public roads/highways and other symbols of the Confederacy remain across the country, mainly in the south. Not only did many of the early white Olympians fight for the confederacy and return here, many others emigrated this way to avoid prosecution for war crimes and treason to the United States. They brought with them and worked to establish a segregated society like they had in the south, formally and informally, with Jim Crow laws. Segregation was the blueprint in establishing the town/city of Olympia, and the State. City founders, first and foremost by coerced removal of the original people from their lands and then economically, politically, educationally, etc. I have not heard of an audit of local public named schools, roads, etc that may honor such events/people. Aside from the obvious 'Stevens', there are likely other streets named after slave holders, indian killers, and traitorous confederates--including main streets such as Washington, Jefferson, Adams, etc. AND where are the prominent streets named after Nisqually, Squaxin, Chehalis, Puyallup, etc?! Or Charles Mitchell? The virtual narrative is ever-evolving and rooted in real structures (and their absence). It's motivated by an urgent need to correct the record, to shatter the narrative that generations have learned, in part, through the glorification of 'heritage'. Olympians/people have died where I live. More were likely ordered dead from here. But people have lived here too (and still do). <p>

11. What is your experience working with the history or preservation of built/cultural heritage?

I have been active in memorializing cultural events and movements through documentation, photographs, video, public presentations, postings, etc. since first residing downtown. I have created and/or improved media programming primarily through Works In Progress and TCTV. Plus, did you notice, I reside in the historical County Courthouse of 1861--so everyday I parallel park or recycle food scraps or even talk with a neighbor it's like I'm preserving living heritage. I've created a non-commercial landmark from some recycled art that was geo-tagged and is now included in the PokemonGo game, allowing folks to explore something of interest in their immediate environment (Olympia). Also, in embracing, social media more, I created a non-commercial historic/landmark webpage that can be (shared/check in) of Olympia's Moon Tree. BONUS: I'm already working on a website to memorialize Charles Mitchell who fled slavery from Olympia in the newly colonized Washington Territory at age 12. He is the only documented fugitive slave to travel by steamship to the Crown Colony of Victoria, B.C. on the Puget Sound Underground Railroad. I spoke out against the city's renaming Automall Dr over ten years ago as it was clearly economic bullying and buying of public identity and right of way (there's your heritage, right there!). I gathered signatures in opposition as well. I suggested at the time in jest to rename the orphan-block in front of my residence (off Union Ave) after me for the same exact reasons the autodealers were granted their change. AND of course I followed with great interest at the same time the renaming/redesignating efforts of Highway 99 markers by Rep. Dunshee because they commemorated the treasonous confederacy, rather than the Union. I followed the process of rededicating 'King County' to Martin Luther King away from the colonial settler to better reflect the values of modern times for inclusivity, diversity, and respect. AND of course I followed with great interest and marginally participated in the recent local 'Billy Frank' naming process. BONUS: I'm currently following the progress of Centralia's community effort to fund and erect a statue to a town founder of african decent. I'm already planning to follow the process of the new workgroup from SB5237 (Senator Carlyle) to study replacing the official Whitman statue with someone else whose qualifications better align with modern values.
