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# Background

- House Bill 1223 requires, at minimum, audio recording of any custodial interrogation in the field and both audio and video for interrogations conducted at the police department or jail.
- Body-worn cameras and in-car videos are the most appropriate, reliable and safest means to meet this mandate.
- Body-worn cameras further the Department's mission of building trust and transparency.
- The Olympia Police Department requested funding for a body-worn camera and in-car video program, which the Council approved as part of the 2022 budget adoption on December 14, 2021.


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## Production Comparison
