### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Richmond called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

# 3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

# 4. PUBLIC COMMENT

# 5. STAFF ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. Bauer introduced Community Planning and Development's new Senior Planner, Nicole Floyd. Ms. Floyd stated she was excited to be working for the City of Olympia and looks forward to working with the Planning Commission. The Commission

welcomed Ms. Floyd.

Mr. Bauer gave an update on the Community Renewal Area Planning process:

- Tuesday February 2, 2016 City Council has on their agenda consideration of the developer that has been chosen from request for proposals process.
- Monday February 8, 2016 Community Economic & Revitalization Committee will be considering the beginnings of the exclusive negotiating agreement with chosen developer.

# Ms. Phillips announced:

- The application acceptance deadline for the Planning Commission vacancies has been extended until 4 p.m. on February 12, 2016.
- The Olympia Yacht Club is working on replacing some of their floating docks in boat slips and decking on their docks. They plan to start work this Spring.
   The work will be done in phases that will take approximately four years.
- The Kaiser-Harrison opportunity area had an updated market study done.
   There have been interviews with stakeholders and property owners. Public Workshops are planned for February and March.
- A tour of 123 4th Avenue building will be made available for three members of the Planning Commission on Thursday February 11, 2016 at 1:00 p.m.

#### 6. BUSINESS ITEMS

6.A 16-0118 Low Impact Development (LID) Code Revisions - Public Hearing

Mr. Christensen reviewed - Low Impact Development Code Revisions for the Public Hearing.

Chair Richmond opened the meeting up to Members of the Public (Public Hearing portion of the meeting).

Clydia Cuykendall supports staff's recommendations regarding LID code revisions and urges the Commission to approve the revisions.

Chris Montague-Breakwell stated:

- It is unclear to him what exactly the variance process is and how it aligns with the Phase II Permit Appendix I Section VI Variance Assumptions Requirements.
- If the language isn't corrected it could be potentially damaging to the City.
- This issue needs to be corrected and he will submit his concerns in writing to the Commission.

Lou Guethlein supports staff's recommendations regarding LID code revisions and urges the Commission to approve the revisions.

Joshua Deal, the Government Affairs Director for Olympia Master Builders (OMB), representing the developers that will be doing the construction who are concerned about:

- Development of permeable pavements.
- Cost effectiveness and longevity of permeable pavement.
- Flexibility on sloped properties.
- Consistency between municipalities.

Kellen Mangan, a local home builder, owner of High Defination Homes is attending this meeting to:

- Learn more about LID.
- See what the Public and the Commission's thoughts are about the code revisions.

Bob Jacob has been dealing with stormwater issues for over 20 years and believes:

- We need to preserve 65 percent coniferous tree cover and allow no run-off (called 65/0).
- The code revisions will not effect the Sound in the positive.
- The 65/0 approach for new and redevelopment should be adopted by Council.

Jane Stavish is representing the protection of wildlife and is:

- Concerned about builders wanting flexibillity.
- Inquiring about pourous asphalt maintenance.
- Inquiring about maintenance enforcement on properties that install the porous pavement.
- Concerned about public safety and children's exposure to toxins in bioswells.
- Encouring the City to adopt a stronger maintenance plan.

Jim Zahn is concerned about:

- Vegetation and the amount of trees required to be placed on small lots.
- Two foot overhang requirement over an impervious area. The size may be too restrictive if the intent is to protect the structure from rain.

Chair Richmond closed the public hearing and indicated that written comments from the public will be accepted until February 12, 2016 - 5:00 p.m.

Commission Discussion:

- Reducing small parking spaces
- Pin foundations
- Reduction in parcel size for clearing permits
- Cottage housing zoning on remaining undeveloped land

The public hearing was held and closed.

## **6.D** <u>16-0068</u> Housing in Olympia Report - Discussion

Mr. Stamm gave a briefing:

- The updated Olympia Comprehensive Plan adopted in December of 2014 provides that, "The City will annually provide information to citizens on affordable housing, family incomes, and market-rate housing."
- Consistent with this directive, City staff will be preparing the first such report, tentatively entitled 'State of Housing in Olympia,' for release in 2017.
- City staff provided Commission members with a snapshot of the types of information that may be included in the 2017 report.

#### The information was received.

## 7. REPORTS

Commission Parker reported that he will be joining a multi-modal task force for transportation.

Chair Richmond and Commissioner Andresen attended the General Government meeting on Friday:

- The Arts Commission indicated that they want to go forward with a Request For Qualifications for an art project for the gateway on Plum St.
- Advisory committee application acceptance deadline are extended through February 12, 2016.

Commissioner Hoppe reported that the Design Review Board will be reviewing Dick's Sporting Goods on February 11, 2016.
