INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT REGARDING THE STUDY AND DEVELOPMENT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR A REGIONAL APPROACH TO APPROPRIATE ALTERNATIVES TO INCARCERATION

Pursuant to RCW Chapter 39.34, this Interlocal Agreement (Agreement) is made and entered into between and among the City of Olympia, the City of Tumwater, the City of Lacey and Thurston County, collectively hereafter referred to as "Parties" or "the Parties."

WHEREAS, the cost of providing criminal justice services, including the jailing of individuals accused or convicted of a crime continues to escalate; and

WHEREAS, that cost escalation continues to put pressure on the limited resources of the Parties; and

WHEREAS, research suggests that alternatives to incarceration may provide better and more cost effective outcomes for individuals accused or convicted of a crime and for their communities; and

WHEREAS, in our region, a variety of programs, under the general moniker of "Community Corrections," provide alternatives to incarceration and they are being successfully utilized in appropriate settings without compromising public safety; and

WHEREAS, among those jurisdictions offering "Community Corrections" programming is the city of Hillsboro, Oregon; and

WHEREAS, a number of community leaders, elected officials and corrections staff have visited the Hillsboro program and found its model to be of interest and worthy of additional study to determine if some of the approaches would be applicable in our region,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties desire to enter into this Agreement:

- 1. The Parties have committed to funding a study of alternatives to incarceration and the development of appropriate regional recommendations to such alternatives; and
- 2. The Parties have identified Kathleen Gookin as the consultant who will be retained to study and recommend alternatives to incarceration for the Parties;
- 3. Thurston County, on behalf of the Parties, will administer the contract with the consultant, Kathleen Gookin.
- 4. The Parties have agreed to provide funding in the following amounts: City Of Olympia \$6,000; City of Lacey \$1,500; City of Tumwater \$1,500; Thurston County \$6,000; for a total amount of \$15,000.
- 5. The Parties will support the scope of work attached to this Agreement.

- 6. Subject to its other provisions, this Agreement shall be effective when the last signatory approves or ratifies and executes this Agreement, and it shall be terminated no later than 90 days from ratification.
- 7. Each Party, other than Thurston County, shall pay its share of the contract (as outlined in paragraph 4 above) to Thurston County, which will disburse the funds to the consultant upon receipt of invoices at the rate of \$150.00 per hour, up to an amount not exceeding \$15,000. Any funds not invoiced by and disbursed to the consultant shall be returned to the Parties in their proportionate share. Such proportions shall be Forty percent (40%) to the City of Olympia, Forty percent (40%) to Thurston County, Ten percent (10%) to the City of Lacey, and Ten percent (10%) to the City of Tumwater.
- 8. This Agreement shall be recorded with the Thurston County Auditor's Office prior to being effective.
- 9. By signing this Agreement, each signatory is certifying that he or she has authority to sign and that the necessary approval has been obtained from the entity represented by that signatory.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have caused this Agreement to be executed according to the terms written above.
