Background and Analysis:

At its Nov. 28, 2017, meeting, the Olympia City Council approved making the Downtown Ambassador and Clean Team Program part of regular City services. The City of Olympia's Downtown Ambassador and Clean Team launched on Jan. 2, 2018, with "Operation Deep Clean." The Downtown cleanup effort was undertaken with the participation of multiple City departments, including Director of Community Planning and Development (CP&D), Parks, Public Works (Waste Resources, Streets, Signs and Markings) and the Olympia Police Department. The directors from those departments participated, as well as the City Manager.

Part of the Clean Team's strategy is to incorporate mechanization as a means to make a greater impact on removing litter, organics, and other waste. Clean Team lead Mark Moore has arranged to repurpose an existing city vehicle for use as a Clean Team mobile unit. This will allow the Team to collect waste throughout downtown, maintain a high level of productivity, and eliminate the need to

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continuously return to City Hall or the trash compactor to deposit collected waste. Machines such as a street vacuum and leaf blowers will also be used for cleanups. Mr. Moore also has incorporated his experience in Parking Services to devise waste collection routes that mirror those of parking enforcement, maximizing efficiency of waste collection and 'eyes on the street' for spotting and addressing graffiti.

The Downtown Ambassadors have begun reintroducing themselves to every business in the downtown core, and providing newly designed rack cards that highlight the services they provide, the hours they are available and a phone number at which they can be reached. Additional assistance from our Communications Services staff has also produced a dedicated web page on the City's website to highlight both the Ambassadors and Clean Team programs. The Ambassadors and Clean Team programs have become an important and well recognized part of the City's efforts to create a clean and safe downtown. Over the past five years the City has received many compliments about the work of the Team and the critical nature of the effort. Continuing challenges downtown illustrate the need for both the Ambassadors and the Clean Team.



Background and Analysis:

As Council is aware, for 2018 we have hired Jennifer Ziegler Public Affairs to represent the City as our lobbyist. Ms. Ziegler and her associate, Debora Munguia will provide Council with an overview of the 2018 Legislative session, including items of importance for Cities, and expectations for actions during the 60-day session. At its December 12, 2017 meeting, Council adopted the City of Olympia 2018 Legislative Agenda, which includes:

- 1) State resources and support to address homelessness, affordable housing, mental health and chemical dependency services.
- 2) Funding for new US 101 Interchange ramps in West Olympia.
- Funding and policy guidance for research and future projects to address Sea Level Rise.
- 4) Funding to accomplish the work of the Capital Lake/Deschutes EIS Process.

2018 Legislative Priorities:

- State resources and support to address homelessness, affordable housing, mental health and chemical dependency services.
 - Olympia has the highest percentage of rent-burdened households and the highest concentration of the County's homeless.
- Funding for new US 101 Interchange ramps in West Olympia.
 - The Cooper Point Road/Black Lake Boulevard intersection is failing.
 - Addressing congestion in this critical area requires more access from US 101 to West Olympia.
- Funding and policy guidance for research and future projects to address Sea Level Rise.
 - Olympia's downtown is vulnerable to widespread flooding, choking vital transportation corridors and closing our business district.
- Funding to do the work of the Capital Lake/Deschutes EIS Process.
 - Local partners hope to finally find a long-term solution for Capital Lake. However, to do that an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) process that engages the public must be completed.
- Tying property tax revenue growth to population and inflation.
 - Local governments have limited resources. While the cost of city services continues to grow, a primary revenue source, property taxes, is capped.
 - Passing legislation that ties property tax revenue growth to inflation and population, provides the City with the ability to continue to provide essential governmental services.
