Background and Analysis:

In June, 2012, the Downtown Ambassador Program was established as a partnership between the City and Capital Recovery Center, a non-profit organization specializing in mental health services. City Council originally allocated \$50,000 for the program which funded a 6-month pilot project. Council decided to continue funding the program for 2013 to the amount of \$110,000. The Parking and Business Improvement Area board allocated an additional \$36,500 toward the program.

The Downtown Ambassador program consists of two main elements: The Ambassadors and the Clean Team. Ambassadors act as good-will ambassadors assisting downtown users with directions and information. Ambassadors are also trained to provide social service referrals.

The Clean Team focuses on keeping Downtown Olympia clean. Their primary duties include: sweeping sidewalks, graffiti abatement, pressure washing, overflowing trash cans, and emptying/sorting the contents of pedestrian recycle cans.

In March, 2013, Capital Recovery Center (CRC) staff briefed the General Government committee on the current status of the program. The committee asked for the program directors to return in Summer, 2013 to

In addition, Program Manager Rob Richards, will report on recent partnerships the program has established, new equipment/uniforms, recent programmatic changes, and Operation Deep Clean (See Attachment 1).
